
## The Old Becomes New

## Lesson Fifteen

Luke 1, 2; Matthew 1

This lesson will begin the study of the events occurring in the New Testament of the Bible. About four hundred years have passed since the last book of the Old Testament was written. About four hundred years have passed since the last historical event recorded in the Old Testament occurred.

These four hundred years have been referred to as the "silent years." They are silent in that no prophet wrote or spoke. But they are a time of intense preparation for the birth of the Savior. The land of the Israelites is now referred to as Palestine, and it is a crossroads of the civilized world. The great European empires must control this area as they expand



eastward to Asia and as they expand southward into Africa. Consequently, the Israelites have many different rulers in this time. (See map.)

These historical events are paving the way for the arrival of the Savior. Before this time it would have been difficult for the gospel of the Lord to spread throughout the Several world. things distinguish this period of time from any period of time before First of all, when the Greeks were in control of this vast region, the Greek language became the language of all the peoples under their control. Prior to this there was no common language

civilized world. The Romans developed a good network of roads. This made possible fairly good travel conditions over great distances. The Romans also brought a political system that allowed for some diversity of beliefs. The Greeks had become intolerant of all religious systems other than theirs. In fact, they had tried to destroy all copies of the Torah (the first five books of our Old Testament – the Scriptures of the Jewish faith). The Romans started off their rule by massacring the priests and entering the Most Holy Place in the temple. Just because the Romans were a little more tolerant than the Greeks does not mean that life was easy for the faithful Jewish people.

However, the common language and the good network of roads were necessary for the spread of the gospel. The harshness of life under foreign domination made the Jews hope for the promised Messiah who, they thought, would deliver them from foreign rule. Into this setting, Jesus is born. This lesson will cover the angel's visit to Zacharias, John the Baptist's father; the angel's visit to Mary; Mary's visit to Elizabeth, John the Baptist's mother; the birth of John the Baptist; and the birth of our Lord and Savior, Jesus Christ.

#### **ZECHARIAH**

Luke 1

The prophet Isaiah lived and prophesied from shortly before the fall of the northern kingdom (722 B.C.) through most of the reign of King Hezekiah. This was over six hundred years before the birth of Christ. Isaiah foretold of the coming of a person who would make ready the path of the Lord and prepare the people for His arrival. John the Baptist was the fulfillment of this prophecy. He preached repentance for sins and forgiveness of sins. He made the people aware of their need for a Savior. John the Baptist was born to a priest and his wife.

And there appeared to him an angel of the Lord, standing on the right side of the altar of incense. When Zechariah saw him, he was troubled. But the angel said to him, "Fear not, Zechariah; for your prayer is heard, and your wife Elizabeth shall bear a son. You shall call his name John. He shall be great in the sight of the Lord, and he shall be filled with the Holy Spirit. Many of the children of Israel shall he turn to the Lord, their God. He shall go before Him in the spirit and the power of Elijah, to turn the hearts of the fathers to the children and the disobedient to the wisdom of the just; to make ready a people prepared for the Lord."

# THE ANNUNCIATION THE VISIT OF MARY

Luke 1:25-56; Matthew 1:20-24

The angel Gabriel has another person with whom to speak. He must announce to Mary what is about to happen and tell her of her roll in this event. Note that Mary is related to Elizabeth, the mother of John the Baptist.

Read Luke 1:26-29 for details of Mary's encounter with Gabriel.

The angel said to her, "Fear not, Mary; for you have found favor with God. Behold, you shall conceive in your womb and bring forth a son and shall call His name Jesus. He shall be great and shall be called the Son of the Highest; and the Lord God shall give to Him the throne of His father David. He shall reign over the house of Jacob forever; and of His kingdom there shall be no end. Then said Mary to the angel, "How shall this be, seeing I know not a man?" The angel answered and said to her, "The Holy Spirit shall come upon you, and



the power of the Highest shall overshadow you. Therefore, also that holy thing which shall be born of you shall be called the Son of God. Behold, your cousin Elizabeth, she has also conceived a son in her old age. This is the sixth month with her who was barren. For with God nothing shall be impossible." Mary said, "Behold, the handmaid of the Lord; be it unto me according to your word." The angel departed from her.

What Mary has just consented to is no small matter. Betrothal in this time was a much greater commitment than an engagement is today. In fact, for a betrothal to be broken required a divorce. However, as serious a commitment as a betrothal represented, it did not allow for sexual relations between the couple. Sexual relations outside of marriage is adultery. The punishment for adultery at this time was death by stoning. To become pregnant outside of marriage could certainly lead to death for the woman. Mary is aware of all of this. Her trust in the Lord is complete.

Where does this event occur?




