
Lesson Sixteen

Luke 2; Matthew 2,3 Mark 1; John 1

This lesson will cover the childhood of Jesus. Several unusual things occur in His childhood that indicate the role He will have in the salvation of mankind. Two people of devout faith, Simeon and Anna, recognize who Jesus is in his infancy. The wise men travel from far distances to worship the baby as a king. Jesus himself gives an indication of His identity when He stays behind in Jerusalem at the temple when he is twelve. Each of these episodes is covered in this lesson.

The ministry of John the Baptist is also included in this lesson. Remember that he is to go before the Lord preparing the people for Him. This must happen before the public ministry of the Lord can begin.

The various places that were important in the childhood of Jesus can be found on the map below. Refer to it throughout the lesson.



THE CIRCUMCISION AND THE PRESENTATION

Luke 2:21-40

The circumcision and the presentation are two different events. Jesus is named at the time of the circumcision. The presentation occurred forty days after the birth. This is the amount of time Mary had to wait after the birth of her son in order to go to the temple. She was to offer a sacrifice for her purification. Her sacrifice was probably two pigeons or doves. At this time it was proper for Jesus to be presented as the firstborn child. The

firstborn of both man and animal was to be dedicated to the Lord. Animals were sacrificed and firstborn children were to serve the Lord. The Levites took on the responsibility of service to the Lord in place of the firstborn males of Israel.

THE VISIT OF THE WISE MEN THE FLIGHT TO EGYPT

Matthew 2

Nativity scenes often picture the wise men as being present the very night of the birth of Jesus. Actually they came some months later and visited Jesus at the house where He lived. The number of wise men is also not known. Because there were three gifts presented, the assumption has been made that there were three wise men. The Bible does not specify the number. The wise men were probably astrologers from Persia or Arabia.

Now when Jesus was born in Bethlehem of Judea in the days of Herod the king, wise men came from the East to Jerusalem saying, "Where is He that is born King of the Jews? For we have seen His star in the East and have come to worship Him." When Herod the king heard these things, he was troubled and all Jerusalem with him. When he had gathered all the chief priests and scribes of the people together, he demanded of them where Christ should be born. They said to him, "In Bethlehem of Judea. For thus it is written by the prophet, 'And you Bethlehem in the land of Judea are not the least among the princes of



Judah; for out of you shall come a Governor that shall rule My people Israel." Then Herod, when he had privately talked to the wise men, inquired of them diligently what time the star appeared. He sent them to Bethlehem and said, "Go and search diligently for the young Child. When you have found Him, bring me word again that I may come and worship Him also."

Stay there until I bring you word, for Herod will seek the young Child to destroy Him." When he arose, he took the young Child and His mother by night and departed into Egypt. They remained there until the death of Herod that it might be fulfilled which was spoken of the Lord by the prophet saying, "Out of Egypt have I called My Son."

But when he heard that Archelaus reigned in Judea in the place of his father Herod, he was afraid to go there notwithstanding, being warned by God in a dream, he turned aside into the parts of Galilea and came and dwelt in a city called Nazareth that it might be fulfilled which was spoken by the prophets, "He shall be called a Nazarene."

THE CHILD JESUS IN THE TEMPLE

Luke 2:41-52

Jewish males were supposed to attend three festivals each year. The three festivals were Passover, Pentecost, and Tabernacles. Since many Jewish people lived at great distances from Jerusalem, few attended all three. Most tried to attend one, and the one most

often chosen was the Feast of the Passover. The men were allowed to take their families with them. Jesus' family in this episode is attending the Feast of the Passover.

Jewish boys took on responsibility in the religious community at the age of thirteen. At the age of twelve they began to prepare for that upcoming event. Jesus takes that preparation very seriously. **Read Luke 2:41-45.**

It may seem strange that Jesus' parents took such a long time to notice that He was not with them. With so many people going to Jerusalem at the same time, many friends from the same towns probably traveled together. Jesus' parents probably assumed He was with some friends somewhere in the larger group.

It came to pass that after three days they found Him in the Temple sitting in the midst of the teachers both hearing them and asking them questions. All that heard Him



were astonished at His understanding and answers. When His parents saw Him, they were amazed. His mother said to Him, "Son, why have You thus dealt with us? Behold, Your father and I have sought You sorrowing." He said to them, "How is it that you sought Me? Did you not know that I must be about My Father's business?" They did not understand what He said to them

JOHN THE BAPTIST

Matthew 3:1-12, Mark 1:1-8, Luke 3:1-18, John 1:19-28

In last week's lesson, John the Baptist was shown to be the one who would prepare the way for Jesus. Exactly how he did this is the topic for this section of this lesson.

In the fifteenth year of the reign of Tiberius Caesar, when Pontius Pilate was governor of Judea, the word of God came to John the Baptist in the wilderness of Judea. He came into all the country about Jordan preaching the baptism of repentance for the remission of sins saying, "Repent, for the kingdom of heaven is at hand." John was clothed with camel's hair and with a leather belt about his waist, and he ate locusts and wild honey.

Then the people of Jerusalem and Judea and all the region round about the Jordan went out to him and were baptized by him in the Jordan confessing their sins. When he saw many of the Pharisees and Sadducees coming to his baptism, he said to them, "O generation of vipers! Who has warned you to flee from the wrath to come? Bring forth, therefore, fruits meet for repentance. Think not to say within yourselves, 'We have Abraham for our father';



for I say to you God is able of these stones to raise up children to Abraham. Now also the ax is laid to the root of the trees; therefore, every tree which does not bring forth good fruit is cut down and cast into the fire."

The people asked him saying, "What shall we do, then?" He answered and said to them, "He that has two coats, let him give one to him that has none. He that has meat, let him do likewise."

Then came also publicans (tax collectors) to be baptized and said, "Master, what shall we do?" He said to them, "Exact no more than that which is appointed you." The soldiers likewise demanded of him saying, "And what shall we do?" He said to them, "Do violence to no man, neither accuse falsely, and be content with your wages."
