The Call to Prayer Lesson 1

Introduction:

"Whatever good may be done is done and brought about by prayer, which alone is the omnipotent empress. In human affairs we accomplish everything through prayer. What has been properly arranged we keep in order, what has gone amiss we change and improve, what cannot be changed and improved we bear, overcoming all the trouble and sustaining all the good by prayer. Against force there is no help but prayer alone." --Martin Luther

Prayer is our most important line of communication with our Heavenly Father. It is His communications network surpassing in power and complexity anything our modern technologists dream of on the "information superhighway."

It is a source of learning, a source of influence, a source of comfort, a source of action, a source of all that is needed to maintain our lives in peace, harmony, and productivity.

After faith, it is one of the most important ingredients of our religious life.

All of us pray several times a day. Our intention in this course is to give you an opportunity to enrich your prayer life and help you to organize it to a specific end. That is; the ministry of this church and your pastor.

A term we are going to be using often is "intercessory prayer." That is we are going to ask in a persistent and consistent manor for God to intercede in the events and life at (name of congregation) and Pastor (name) with regard to God's plans and countering Satan's plans.

In this study we are going to look at Prayer from a historical point of view as God revealed it to us in examples from the Old and New Testament and in the modern church. The purpose of this study is to help you to have an unshakable faith that our Father will answer your prayers and assurance that He wants and calls us to constantly, frequently, orderly and relationally pray for the church, the state, each other and ourselves.

This is also our own church heritage. Dietrich reported about Luther: "I cannot admire his extraordinary joy, steadfastness, faith, and hope enough in these miserable times; but he nourishes them constantly by zealously busying himself with the Word of God. No day passes by without him spending at least three hours in prayer, hours which would seem best suited for studying."

God's Plan for Conducting our Affairs

(The Jethro Principle)
Exodus 18:19-23

In today's culture and even in the climate of the church, emphasis is placed on action. The question is: "What are we doing that will make our church grow?". I recall the Jethro Principle being explained to those attending a 200 Barrier Church Growth Seminar. And the emphasis was placed upon delegating responsibility. In the last year or so I have revisited this principle to discover something very interesting to me. And that is that Jethro was first interested in one's relationship to God, their prayer life, that the Word be taught, it involved the right world view and then finally, appropriate action be taken according to the spirituality, faithfulness and giftedness of the leadership. We turn this process on its head in our rush and even panic to grow and grasping, many times at straws, for a way to grow our congregation. With that, I have to conclude that the Jethro Principle profoundly involves prayer as intrigal to the ministry to which God calls us, as He called Moses.

IV. Framework for Prayer

A. Biblical

1) The Place of Prayer in the Old Testament

Comment on the Prayer life of the following:

Adam: Gen 3:8 Adam had a wonderful prayer life with God until he fell.

Enoch: Gen. 5:22-24 *Can prayer be described as walking fellowship with God?*

Abraham: Gen. 12:8; Gen. 15:1-6; 18:23-33; James 2:23 <u>Prayer seems also to be descriptive of a relationship. We talk with our creator. We talk because we believe. Our belief or trust is seen as God promises to see it: our righteousness. Because we believe we will talk with God because He is also our friend.</u>

Moses: Exodus 3:5; 4:10-15; 17:10-13; 32:11-14; 33:12-13 <u>It is important</u> not to trivalize this relationship by imagining that we stand on equal ground with God. God is the Holy One.

David: Ps. 6, 8 *The Lord hears us in our sorrow*

Solomon: 1 Kings 17:22ff God does listen to His children.

Daniel: Daniel 9:23 God is quick to answer

2) The Place of Prayer in the New Testament

9:37-38 Pray for the faithful through which the Lord may work

Mark 1:32-35 *Jesus made time in a busy schedule to spend time in prayer*

14:23 Jesus Himself sought the place of prayer

John 17:1-26 <u>the high priestly prayer: Jesus approaches the cross and real trial</u> and yet He prays and intercedes for others

Heb. 5:7_ *A picture of Jesus' prayer life. Would we today receive this as acceptable?*
